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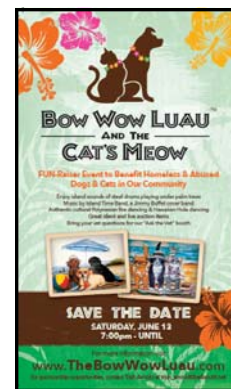

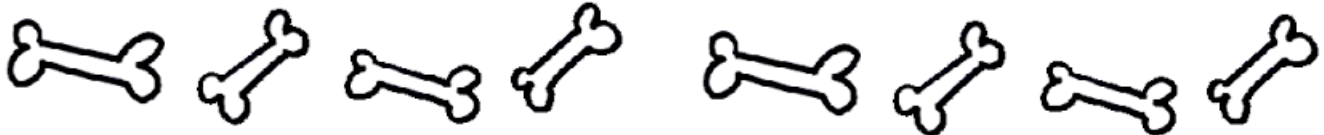

NORTH CAROLINA NEEDS LAWS TO PROTECT DOGS IN PUPPY MILLS

Thousands of dogs spend their entire lives suffering in the cages of puppy mills. Most people are unaware that when they buy a puppy at a pet store or through the internet, they are supporting an extremely cruel and inhumane industry.



There are no specific laws in North Carolina for dogs sold to the public or on-line or through commercial breeding facilities. As a result, negligent breeding has flourished and North Carolina has become a haven for some of the worst puppy mill breeders in the entire country. Sadly, thousands of dogs spend their lives suffering because there are no laws to protect them and give them even the most basic care.

Fortunately, legislation has been introduced to put basic systems in place to protect dogs in puppy mills. House Bill 159 will improve the health and safety of dogs in breeding facilities. This bill will require commercial breeders to be registered and to provide the very basic standards of care, including:

- **Adequate food, water, shelter and protection from extreme weather**
- **Basic veterinary care, exercise and human contact**
- **Cage space for dogs to sit and turn around comfortably**

It's sad that North Carolina doesn't have laws to provide these innocent animals with the most basic care. Laws are long overdue! Please take action to convey your support of House Bill 159. Our animals deserve better and we can help them achieve this!



Please let our representatives know that you care about the way dogs are treated and that you support these very basic provisions to protect dogs in puppy mills. Most all other states have these laws, let's not let our dogs down...they are counting on us! Let's be the voice they all need!!

Pet Overpopulation

When it comes to pet overpopulation, there is good news and bad news. Bad news first-approximately 4 million dogs and cats are killed every year in shelters across the country. Now for the good news-there are things you can do to help bring this number to zero! First and most importantly, make sure your current furry family members are spayed or neutered. In addition to the various health benefits of spaying or neutering your pet is the fact that shelters are already full of all the puppies and kittens you could ever want, so why not adopt one of those?

Speaking of adopting, why not adopt your next pet from a shelter? This is the second way you can help reduce the number of homeless ani-

mals. Don't be fooled by the common misconception that there is something wrong with animals who live in shelters, that they are somehow damaged or defective. The truth is that many animals who end up in shelters have nothing wrong with them and end up there through no fault of their own.



Here are a few common reasons animals end up in shelters: 1) their person moved to an apartment that doesn't allow pets; 2) their person died and none of the family members wants to keep the pet; and 3) their person cannot afford to

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take care of them anymore. These animals are often victims of circumstance and are merely homeless, not defective. By adopting an animal from a shelter, you save not only that animal's life but also the life of the animal who can take your new pet's place at the shelter. It won't be hard to find pet parents who swear that animals they adopted from shelters know they have been rescued and show their new families tons of love and gratitude!



A third way to help save homeless animals is to foster an animal. Fostering provides a number of wonderful benefits for both you and your foster pet. First, taking a foster pet into your home opens up valuable space that the shelter can use to save another animal. Second, your foster pet can get used to

a home environment, which increases his chances of getting adopted. Shelters can be scary noisy places, full of unfamiliar smells, sounds, and people. Some animals act out in response to this stress, while others shut down physically and emotionally. Either way, the animal's true personality does not show through, and that can lead to an animal being labeled "unadoptable" when in reality, he would be a fantastic pet. Providing a home environment allows your foster pet to relax and to show what an awesome family member he would be! Third, as a foster parent, you get to be part of the happy endings for so many animals as each finds his forever home, and who doesn't love happy endings?

Shelters aren't the only places that need your help though; rescue groups need help too, so be sure to find the ones near you!

In the long run, what matters the most to homeless pets is that you do *something* to help bring that number down to zero!!

Disaster Preparation for Pets



How prepared are you for a natural disaster when it comes to your pet? Having to figure out what you need to do can be overwhelming, but thankfully, there are organizations out there that have taken the guesswork out of it. Preparing a Pet First Aid Kit

Emergencies can occur at any time, so it is important to have a pet emergency kit packed for your pets. This kit should include your pet's medical, along with the telephone of your veterinarian and the nearest emergency-veterinary clinic.

Also have the phone number of the poison-control center or hotline (ASPCA poison-control phone number is 1-800-426-4435).

Basic first-aid supplies to be included:

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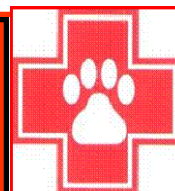
- Absorbent gauze pads
- Adhesive tape
- Antiseptic wipes, lotion, powder or spray
- Blanket
- Cotton balls or swabs
- Gauze rolls
- Ice pack
- Non-latex disposable gloves
- Petroleum jelly (to lubricate the thermometer)
- Scissors (with blunt ends)
- Sterile non-stick gauze pads for bandages
- Sterile saline solution (sold at pharmacies)
- Tweezers
- Rectal thermometer
- Scissors (with blunt ends)
- Sterile non-stick gauze pads for bandages
- Sterile saline solution (sold at pharmacies)
- Tweezers
- A pet carrier

As summer approaches and vacations are planned, check to make sure your pet's I.D. is current in case you need to leave your pets in someone else's care while you are traveling. Be sure to update Microchip registry information also.

Top 10 Pet Toxins



In 2014, ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center handled over 167,000 calls regarding animals who had gotten into poisonous substances. Many of these poisonous substances are found in many households across the country. Many of these everyday products can be dangers toxins for our pets. Please keep these items out of contact with pets. For a full listing of pet toxins, ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center has a mobile app for a database of over 275 pet toxins.

If you fear that your pet has gotten into any toxic substance, call your veterinarian immediately or call ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center's 24 hour hotline at (888) 426-4435.

ASPCA's Top 10 Poisonous Substances for Pets:

1. **Human prescription medications** are the toxins that are most often exposed to pet.
2. **Over-the-counter medications**—this includes medications, as well as natural substances
3. **Lawn/Garden Products** — Please store these lawn and garden items out of reach of pets.
4. **Insecticides**
5. **Household products**—this includes paints and cleaning products
6. **Human Foods**—grapes, garlic, onions, raisins and xylitol, a sugar substitute that can be life-threatening to animals.
7. **Veterinary medications**—Please be especially careful of chewable medications
8. **Chocolate** is very common pet poison call. The darker the chocolate, the more potential to do harm to the pets.
9. **Plants**--Most of the calls into ASPCA involve cats and plants.
10. **Rodenticides** are designed to kill mice and rats, but can also kill pets if ingested.

Best Friends Animal Society's National No More Homeless Pets Conference

I first discovered Best Friends Animal Society in 2005, in the aftermath of the disaster of Hurricane Katrina. The images of dogs and cats stranded on the rooftops, in critical need for rescue, led me to find an animal organization who would make the best use of my donations to help these animals in desperate need. Best Friends was the first national organization on the ground in the flooded areas of New Orleans and they were the last to leave. Over 4,000 animals came through Best Friends Animal Sanctuary's rescue and shelter operations and they transported another 2,000 displaced pets.

In 2007, Best Friends Animal Society came to the rescue again after the dog fighting bust of Michael Vick's Bad Newz Kennels, where innocent dogs lived and died in some of the most brutal, inhumane and horrifying conditions. Best Friends took in 22 of the most challenging dogs seized in the raid on Michael Vick's property. These dogs were taken to Best Friends where, they worked with the best trainers and, for the first time in their lives, they were treated with love and respect. They were given the fitting name of, "Vicktory Dogs" to demonstrate that they could be rehabilitated, adopted into good families and some would live the remainder of their lives at the Best Friends sanctuary. And, all of them would become victorious over their heartbreaking past.

After discovering Best Friends Animal Society, I began supporting their lifesaving work through donations. Their positive mes-

sage on animal rescue was much of the inspiration of my founding my annual animal rescue FUN-raiser, *The Bow Wow Luau & The Cat's Meow®*, which has raised over \$48,717.00 to benefit thousands of homeless and abused dogs and cats in my community.

In October 2014, Best Friends Animal Society hosted their National No More Homeless Pets conference in Las Vegas. I was fortunate to participate along with 1,700 other animal advocates from all around the world. This conference also marked Best Friend's 30 year anniversary and it was a milestone to celebrate the wonderful work they do for animals. Thirty years ago, a group of fellow animal advocates pioneered the no-kill movement at a time when more than 17 million homeless pets were dying each year in America's shelters. Today, that number is at four million homeless dogs and cats who are killed each year across our country, simply because they don't have homes.



At the National No More Homeless Pets Conference, many of the original co-founders of Best Friends Animal Society were there shared their stories of how they began their journey 30 years ago, at a time when there were almost no no-kill shelters and many people said that a

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movement to “Save Them All” could not be done. But they persevered through hard work, determination and dedication to stop the killing---because the animals were counting on them!



I was fortunate to meet each of the co-founders who were at the conference and I shared with them how Best Friends was much of the inspiration of my animal rescue FUN-raiser, *The Bow Wow Luau & The Cat's Meow®*. When I shared this story with two of the co-founders, Francis and Sylvia Bastilla, Sylvia was fascinated about their inspiration and the success of my animal rescue fundraiser and she invited me to lunch the following week when I would be at the Best Friends Sanctuary. When I met her for lunch, she invited a fellow co-founder, Gabriel de Peyer. It was such an honor and a privilege to be invited to lunch by co-founders of the animal rescue organization that I admire so much and has been such an inspiration to me!

The setting of Best Friends is breathtaking, nestled in the majestic canyons of the Grand Canyon's as the backdrop. At any given time, Best Friends is home to over 1,800 dogs, cats, horses, pigs, bunnies, goats, birds and many other animals who have been abandoned, suffered injury, loss and/or trauma.

I spent the next few days volunteering with dogs, cats and horses who are at the sanc-


tuary, either awaiting their new homes or living their lives in the beautiful environment of the majestic canyons on the north rim of the Grand Canyon. While I was at the sanctuary, I met two of Michael Vick's former fighting dogs, who have been rehabilitated. Each of these dogs were so sweet and gentle and prove that dogs can be rehabilitated and can overcome horrendous circumstances to become their very fitting name, of “Victory Dogs”.

After my participation to the Best Friends National No More Homeless Pets Conference and in visiting the Best Friends Animal Sanctuary, I am even more inspired and motivated to help save homeless, abused and abandoned animals in my community and beyond!



This year, Best Friends Animal Society's National No More Homeless Pets Conference will be in our part of the country! It will be held in Atlanta, July 16—19, 2015, and I look forward to participating again. I invite each of you to join me at the No More Homeless Pets conference and to get involved in animal rescue in our own communities and beyond.

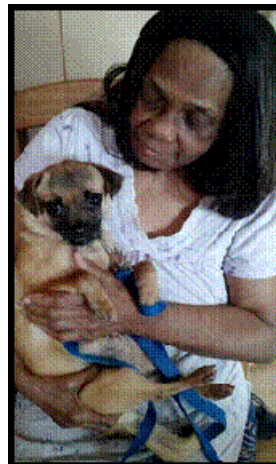
Who Rescued Who?

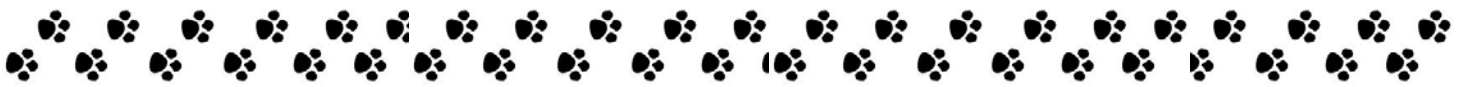

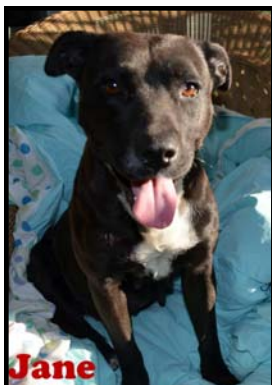
Basil: He is an 8 year old neutered male. He came from a hoarding situation where the owner had passed away and his sister was fighting to save the lives of all the babies in his home. He is extremely loving! He was one of 15 living in deplorable conditions. He had a teeth cleaning today (Monday). He needs training and knows how to use a doggy door.



Natalie: She came from Wayne County Shelter. She is one of four females taken in from a "backyard breeding" situation. She is estimated to be 1 year old and in good health. She is playful and super friendly with other pups. Very shy with humans, but will take food from your hand and accept rubs. She is house trained, but is a little thief if she is capable. She likes to steal objects from counters, tables or any object she can reach. This would be best handled with crating and proper training. She is guessed to be a whippet mix and weighs approximately 18 pounds.



Pete: He is such a sweet soul. He has a long way to go as far as trusting new people and new situations. He came from Goldsboro Animal Shelter with a female we named Mindy (picked up as stray). She has since been adopted and Pete is still struggling. He absolutely loves puppies, small dogs and babies. He gets very nervous around strangers or very active children. He needs to learn to trust. They were set to be put down the day we took them (him and Mindy). He is house trained and is very happy sleeping in his fosters



Jane: Jane was picked up as a stray. She had a severe gash on her back, right along her spine. It was later determined that it was a bullet wound. The bullet grazed her back and did not cause "severe" damage. She is completely healed and loving life. She is such a sweet girl and loves attention! She walks very well on lead and is house trained. She gets along well with all other dogs she has met. She does become crate dominate (if in a crate, she becomes anxious if another dog comes near).

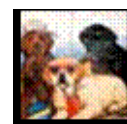


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
